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# 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

Atma Ram Sanatan Dharma College (popularly known as ARSD College), a co-educational constituent college of the University of Delhi, was founded on 3 August 1959 by the Sanatan Dharma Sabha (Rawalpindi) based in Delhi. The visionaries behind this dream were Sh. Mela Ram Jaggi Ji, Sh. Ganga Ram Gujral Ji and Sh. Lala Devi Ditta Shah Talwar. In 1968, Shri Atma Ram Chadha Ji joined the college governing body.

Atma Ram Sanatan Dharma College is a premier educational institution of Delhi University which aims to nurture excellence in education. It emphasizes on fostering quality of human resources and promoting productive ideas that benefit the students. Since its inception, the College has focused on character building and idealism inspired by Sanatani values. The College embraces Inclusivity and Equitability as its founding principles. Promotion of women's education and ensuring a barrier-free, non-discriminatory, and supportive ecosystem for all members of the College are, therefore, a priority at ARSD College.

The College is concerned primarily with creating an institution in tune with contemporary demands and enabling the holistic development of all its stakeholders. College's exponential growth over the past few years, its emphasis on undergraduate research, entrepreneurial initiatives, skill development, strong industry-institution linkages, and ICT-enabled learning environment, are geared towards the facilitation of sustainable and self-sufficient systems as well as institutions. The motto of the College, *Tejasvi-naavadhitam-astu*, has been taken from Taittiriya Upanishad and means, "May our learning be endowed with radiance". The College takes pride in its past achievements and looks to the future with great hope and determination.

The College is a constituent College of the esteemed University of Delhi functioning as per the policy framework laid under the Act and Statutes of the latter. The College follows the rules and regulations mandated by the UGC with regard to appointments, teaching, admissions, examination and research in higher education.

The College ranked 7th in NIRF Ranking 2022 and now is one of the most sought-after colleges in the University of Delhi. The College offers 17 undergraduate courses and 4 postgraduate courses, apart from various add-on/certificate/value-addition courses.

The College has been ranked 5th nationally in 2017 to rank 14th in 2018 and 2019, 13th in 2020 and 12th in 2021 by NIRF. In all parameters, the score has been high and a comparative analysis with other colleges of the University places ARSD College in a favourable light. In the criteria of TLR, the College is ranked number 1 in all DU colleges in NIRF ranking 2021. As per the NIRF Ranking 2022, the College secured 7th rank and the Research Publication Score of the College was the highest among all Delhi University Colleges. ARSD also ranked all India 5th in placement category in India Today Rankings 2022.

## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

### **Curricular Aspects**

In Planning and implementation of curricular aspects, ARSD adheres to the norms of University of Delhi. It offers 17 undergraduate courses and 4 postgraduate programmes. The college ensures effective curriculum delivery which includes timetables and lesson plans uploaded on the website and department notice boards before the semester starts and research-oriented, highly qualified and stable workforce adopting innovative teaching methods. Specific orientation programmes are conducted for different departments/streams, elective papers and societies in addition to the general Orientation programme. Critical thinking is encouraged through participation in research projects, debates and class discussions while creativity is fostered through the College magazine, newsletters, and extra-curricular activities.

The College has a mentoring system in place to help students navigate their undergraduate years effectively. Student-Faculty Committee provides space for dialogue between faculty members and student representatives on issues of curriculum and delivery. During the pandemic, teaching-learning activities were carried out online through various modes of e-learning. E-content was uploaded on the College website and shared through various social media platforms. Internal Assessments are organized in a timely, routine, and transparent manner. After evaluation, marks are shared with students as well as uploaded on website, feedback and guidance is provided and grievances are addressed in time-bound and efficient manner.

The college offers add-on, certificate and value-added courses, training sessions and skill-based programmes through different college cells/societies, government institutions, faculty members and experts from industry, academia, etc. to improve entrepreneurial and professional skills of the students. In addition, the College offers wide-ranging opportunities for field trips and internships. Judicious selection of papers is done to make responsible citizens inculcating in them ethics and values.

ARSD has strengthened its feedback mechanism, allowing its stakeholders to comment on institutional facilities and processes through a structured online feedback process. In 2019-20, parents were also drawn into the ambit of submitting feedback on college amenities. Visitors, NGOs, and companies are also encouraged to leave their feedback. The responses received are analysed and suggestions are implemented to improve the functioning of the College. In 2020-21, students' observations regarding teachers were collected which were analysed to augment the teaching-learning processes.

### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The demand ratio in all streams has consistently been high and admissions are done as per reservation guidelines. The teaching force is well-equipped with almost 90% of them having NET/SLET/Ph.D degree and has a large number of permanent members, ensuring stable curriculum delivery. Student pass percentage is 95 and is on the rise in most subjects.

The College has Wi-Fi connectivity, ICT-enabled classrooms, fully digitized library and other IT facilities to facilitate experiential learning. During the pandemic the process of teaching/internal assessment/examination got seamlessly transitioned to the online mode and adequate training sessions were organized by the College for the benefit of students and staff.

Participative learning and problem-solving approach is encouraged through participation in classroom discussions/group projects, college/society level events and research activities. Workshops, seminars/conferences/webinars, internships, short-term courses are also organized to widen students' learning horizons and to train them to be industry ready.

The College ensures that Internal Assessment mechanism is transparent and efficient through three tier monitoring of the system and students are given adequate time to discuss their grievances and redressal is done in a time bound manner.

Students are well informed about the Programme/Course Outcomes at College/Departmental orientations and guidance is provided to them to choose optional papers. The attainment of the course outcomes is constantly monitored at the College and Department levels through Academic and Administrative Audits, Student-Faculty Committees and collection and analysis of students' feedback.

### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

ARSD has a strong undergraduate research culture with over 400 undergraduate students involved in research activities. In the last 5 years, over 200 of our faculty members have been involved in several research projects. 11 Innovation, 7 Star Innovative and 41 In-House interdisciplinary projects under DBT STAR College Schemes have been completed involving over 400 students. During 2017-2022, Rs. 403.1 lakhs have been received as EMR grants. Funding Agencies include UGC, DST-SERB, ICMR, ICSSR, JSPS, CSIR, DBT, DU, among others. One faculty member, Dr. Sunita Bhagat got a patent awarded on her name.

In five years, faculty members have published 727 research articles, 288 books/chapters in books/popular articles/book reviews/poems across departments and participated in 1128 Faculty Empowerment programmes. The College has organized 2 two-week long interdisciplinary Refresher Courses, 4 week-long FDPs, 4 one-day FDPs, several national/international conferences and over 600 academic events.

The College has made big initiatives in the form of setting up of Technology Business Incubator, launching an In-house Interdisciplinary Research and Innovation Projects Scheme (PRABODH), setting up of a recording studio, MoUs with two universities for research collaboration, MoU with NPC, GoI for capacity building programmes, Initiation of a Job and Internship Fair by Placement Cell, Theatre Certificate course, participation in Vidya Vistar Scheme and Unnat Bharat Abhiyan, among others.

The College has expanded the scope of its extension and ISR activities. During 2017-22, around 250 outreach and extension activities were conducted through various college societies such as blood donation camps, slum adoption, SVEEP, Swacchta Pakhwara, relief funds, etc. During pandemic also the societies worked incessantly.

ARSD has entered into MoUs with Jagruti for recycling and the Society for Disability and Rehabilitation Studies for betterment of differently-abled students. During the Lockdown, the College crowdfunded one physically challenged ex-student, offered full fee waiver to 11 students who lost their parents to COVID-19,

donated three oxygen concentrators to the University of Delhi. ARSD has been awarded by several organizations for its inclusive, environmentally conscious campus.

### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The College is spread out over 12.31 acres and is equipped with 60 classrooms, 17 research labs, 17 laboratories and computer labs, 3 seminar halls with ICT facilities, 2 well equipped Committee Rooms, 25 classrooms with projectors, a medical room, a counsellor's room, staff room, department rooms, offices, photocopy and printing centre, Boys' and girls' common rooms (with a sanitary dispenser), parking for students and faculty, and an atrium with seating capacity for 500 along with lush green lawns and well-maintained cricket ground, basketball, volleyball and badminton courts, table-tennis, open gymnasium and Mother Dairy and Nescafe kiosk. For inclusivity of differently abled, facilities like ramps, wheelchairs, tactile pathways, customized washrooms and teaching aids in the library are available.

College has 1024 laptops, 255 desktops, 7 computer labs, and browsing centres. Since 2017, infrastructural modifications and renovations have been done. Whole campus has been made wi-fi enabled. E-content has been developed by faculty members and lectures and reading material have been uploaded on college website and Youtube channel. Audio-visual studio has been formed to facilitate ICT-enabled teaching-learning. An updated user-friendly College website has been designed, developed and maintained in-house using Wordpress along with a mobile-friendly version winning DU's Best Website Award in the College category in 2019. Faculty members used different modules and software tools to make online teaching effective. Online science practicals were conducted smoothly via virtual labs like Amrita labs. The College has well-developed processes and committees for the maintenance of facilities.

The College has a two-stored and Wi-Fi-enabled library which operates on an 'Open Access' system. It uses SOUL 3.0 Integrated Library Management Software to automate housekeeping operations. Library software facilitates OPAC functions, subscribes to INFLIBNET- NLIST database and is a member of the Developing Library Network (DELNET). It has a seating capacity for about 130, Students' Aid Fund section, laptops, desktops and an e-resource centre. There are several open access resources available for students and staff. The College Library provides internship opportunities to students of Delhi Library Association and IGNOU.

### **Student Support and Progression**

The College disseminates information about student support services via website, notice boards, handbooks and prospectus. In addition to many welfare means for students, the meritorious students get scholarships, research projects, slow learners get remedial classes, and needy ones get financial and book aids. The College organizes extracurricular activities and runs ancillary programmes for the inclusive development of the students. IQAC organised counselling sessions for students in collaboration with Zyego, in addition to a counsellor in campus and mentoring system in place. Students are an intrinsic part of all College processes—academic, administrative, and co-curricular. Students are encouraged to give their feedback on any perceived drawbacks. All student grievances are settled within a week. Office staff have been sensitized to ensure a positive experience for students.

The wide range of Societies and Department Associations and Seminars arrange talks/seminars/conferences/workshops/festivals which enhance skills, provide add-on learning, hands-on training and create an interface with the industry introducing the students to the real-life scenario. 4 new

societies and 4 new wings under cultural society have been formed to fill a gap in terms of the opportunities available to the student body. The College observes days of national significance and participates in all governmental initiatives. The Alumni contribute to the corporate life of the institution through mentoring, financial support, quality enhancement and improving college perception.

Students are achievers not only in academics but in other fields also. They are keen sportspersons, great writers with bestsellers to their credit, winning accolades as NCC cadets and NSS volunteers, harbingers of social change and making their presence felt through different society works.

In the last five years more than 75% students have gone into higher studies and/or placed in jobs. The Placement Cell organises Jobs and internship fair and provides jobs and internships with the numbers rising every year which got the college all India 5th position in India Today Rankings 2022 in placement category.

Various initiatives were taken for the students during pandemic ranging from awareness activities, academic practices, job opportunities, emotional wellbeing, medical assistance to administrative aids.

### **Governance, Leadership and Management**

The College believes in a decentralized, participative form of governance with well-defined processes and committees at every level. The College, a constituent College of the University of Delhi, follows UGC rules and regulations with regard to appointments, teaching, admissions, examination and research in higher education. The college facilitates optimum utilization of institutional capabilities for the successful deployment of its perspective plans as is evident from its NIRF rankings over the last five years.

A conducive work environment keeps the workforce motivated through various effective welfare schemes, time bound Performance Appraisal System and other facilities in the College campus. Faculty and staff regularly attend development programmes to keep themselves updated.

As a public institution, the College conducts its audit process in accordance with the extant guidelines. The College follows the rules and procedures as laid down in General Financial Rules (GFR) regarding all financial dealings and most of the purchases are done through the GeM portal.

The College has an effective Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) that works to ensure continuous improvement in all institutional processes. The College in an effort to augment its research capabilities has entered into MoUs/Collaborations with other institutions. The Placement and other cells of the College are working towards skill upgradation at the students' level by organizing several short-term courses/workshops/seminars/webinars and providing them with internship opportunities. IQAC, by collecting and analyzing feedback from all stakeholders and facilitating the conduct of Academic and Administrative Audits, reviews the teaching learning process at regular intervals.

### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

The Women Development Cell through its myriad activities sensitizes and educates female students in a holistic manner. The College has dedicated facilities for its female students and staff. The College through its various societies works to ensure barrier-free access on Campus and the empowerment of people with disabilities. The college works on the several facets of 'Green Campus' and has been awarded by several

organizations for being an inclusive, environmentally conscious campus.

The College, through its IQAC and various societies like NSS, NCC, Women Development Cell, Gandhi Study Circle, Ambedkar Study Circle, Equal Opportunity Cell, Rangayan, Enactus, Eco Club etc., is actively engaged in sensitizing students and employees towards being constitutionally responsible citizens by celebrating various national and international commemorative days, events and festivals.

The commitments and endeavours of the College to research and outreach activities has culminated into the following two best practices of the College:

- **Research-Oriented Teaching Learning Environment**, which seeks to provide a conducive research environment and optimum utilization of institutional capabilities and encourage research initiatives among students and faculty.
- **Institutional Social Outreach Activities** to enable students to empathize with and act upon the ground level socio-economic issues towards realizing the Sustainable Development Goals.

The College envisages to equip the students with enhanced employability and entrepreneurial skills in tune with the contemporary demands through various initiatives like add-on courses, training workshops, internships, research and entrepreneurial opportunities. These endeavours have continued with full vigour even during the pandemic times.

### **Institutional preparedness for NEP**

<p>1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:</p>	<p>Appreciating the need for radical changes in the education system, as envisioned by the New Education Policy, the College initiated some landmark measures for the benefit of the stakeholders and to accomplish the proposed objectives of the NEP. These are listed below: Soon after the announcement of the New Education Policy by the Government of India in 2019, the IQAC of the College organized a one-day seminar on “The New Education Policy and its Challenges” in September 2019. The eminent speakers on the occasion were Prof. Dinesh Singh, Former VC, University of Delhi, Vineet Joshi (IAS), Director General, NTA and Dr. Archana Thakur, Joint Secretary, UGC. A Committee</p>
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was constituted by the Principal to facilitate the implementation of the NEP in the College. A PowerPoint presentation was prepared by the committee on the objectives and proposed structure of the New Education Policy to inform the faculty in this respect. In the email from the Vice Chancellor dated 23rd March, 2021, our college was made the Cluster Head of 11 colleges of the University of Delhi. Online meetings were held with the member colleges and after due discussions and deliberations a document on the observations, suggestions and insights on the proposed concept of Higher Education Commission of India as envisioned by NEP 2020 was prepared. In the Staff-Council held on 10th April 2021, the Principal reported the decision of the New Education Policy Implementation Committee (NIC) of University of Delhi.

- 11 Innovation, 7 Star Innovative and 41 In-House interdisciplinary projects under DBT STAR College Schemes have been completed involving over 400 students.
- Wide range of choices is provided in elective papers like GE and SEC providing interdisciplinary avenues to the students.
- The College makes efforts to integrate cross-cutting issues such as gender, climate change, environmental education, human rights, ICT, etc., into the curriculum to produce sensitive, responsible and global citizens.
- A compulsory course on 'Environmental Studies' is offered to all first-year undergraduates, sensitizing all to the necessity of conservation and holistic ecological practices. In addition, Generic Electives "Biodiversity", "Environmental Biotechnology" are offered by the department of Botany which work towards explaining students the need for reciprocity between nature and human beings.
- In addition, various societies of the college like Women Development Cell, NSS, Rangayan, through seminars, workshops, training sessions and talks actively contribute in creating an atmosphere of gender equality by addressing topics like women rights, menstrual hygiene, cyber safety, inclusion of transgenders, etc.
- Inter-disciplinary national/international seminars/conferences were conducted.
- Strengthening the inter-disciplinary research activities among faculty and students through initiatives like Research and Development Cell with PRABODH and Central Instrumentation Facility as its constituents.
- Planning to publish a

	<p>multidisciplinary bilingual research journal. • Multi-disciplinary two-weeks refresher courses were conducted on “Cinema, Society and Education” and “The Quintessential Educator” along with many FDPs. • A Bilingual three-day training workshop on “The Digital Turn in Education: A new Pattern in teaching-learning practices” was organised for preparing the workforce for a shift in teaching-learning with NEP.</p>
<p>2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):</p>	<p>The UGCF as adopted by the University of Delhi, aims to bring about a systemic change in the higher education system and align itself with the National Education Policy 2020. As a constituent College of the University of Delhi, we are committed to implement the Academic Bank of Credits as envisaged under the UGCF. The University of Delhi is registered with the National Academic Depository (NAD). The National Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) portal has been integrated into the nad.digitallocker.gov.in, a platform that the University has been using to upload students' mark sheets and degree certificates. From the academic year 2022-23, every student enrolling in the University will have to mandatorily register in the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) portal that contains the information of credits earned by individual students. The ABC is a centralized virtual storehouse for records of academic credits secured by a student. It facilitates effective management of academic credit accounting and audit and provides credit mobility which can help a student to redeem credit that he or she has earned across different national and international institutions. This online centralized system will allow the student to choose their own learning path. For UGCF 2022, a total of 176 credits would be offered to students. To become eligible to receive their degrees, they must have at least 50 percent of credits in their respective discipline. ABC will also help in the implementation of the Multiple Entry and Exit System (MEES) in higher education. In order to monitor effective implementation of the ABC system, an adequately trained and efficient technical support staff will be required and the College is all geared-up for the same. Soon after the announcement of the New Education Policy by the Government of India in 2019, a Committee was constituted by the Principal to facilitate the</p>

	<p>implementation of the NEP in the College. A PowerPoint presentation was presented by the committee on the objectives and proposed structure of the New Education Policy including ABC, to inform the faculty in this respect. More workshops will be arranged in near future to train the staff.</p>

International seminars on “Kabeer: Vividh Pariprekshya” and “Desaj Premakhyan” and national seminars on “Kabir and Bhakti Movement” and “Faniswarnath Renu ka Sahitya: Ek Aalochnatmk Vimarsh” are some of them. • Three ten-day Sanskrit</p>

Sambhashan Shivir were organised by the Sanskrit Department in collaboration with Sanskrit Bharti, Delhi to generate interest among the students in Sanskrit Language. • Sanskrit Varta Pratiyogita was organised by the Department of Sanskrit in collaboration with Delhi Sanskrit Academy. • A national seminar on “Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi: Society, Politics and Philosophy” was conducted focussing on the ideologies of our great leader Gandhi. • Two national seminars on “Political Culture in India: Shifting Profiles” and “Caste and Gender, Past and Present: Literary Perspectives” were organised discussing various aspects of Indian culture. • One bi-lingual two-week long refresher course was organised on “Cinema, Society and Education”, another one on “The Quintessential Educator” specifically targeting NEP and the role of teacher in this. • Under Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsava various talks and seminars were conducted discussing various aspects of Indian culture and language. • Poetry sessions were organised inviting eminent Hindi poets. • Matribhasha Diwas, Hindi Diwas and Hindi Pakhwara are celebrated annually inviting eminent poets of different Indian languages. • Hindi Creative writing workshops are arranged honing the skills of the budding writers. • The College has a vibrant Hindi Debating Society which organises workshops, invites eminent personalities along with conducting debates in Hindi. It also organises its annual ‘Vedangam’. • College magazine Udyachal has a separate section for Hindi and Sanskrit write-ups. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):</p>	<p>The College offers 17 undergraduate courses and 4 postgraduate courses, apart from various add-on courses under the Choice Based Credit System, Learning Outcomes based Curriculum Framework and New Education Policy Framework. The College faculty is actively involved in framing University Syllabi for their respective subjects/papers. Teachers regularly attend subject specific meetings conducted by the respective departments at the beginning of every semester to discuss the updation of the Course Curriculum. The course outcomes as mentioned in the syllabus are uploaded on the College website. The information about courses offered is published in the College prospectus for the benefit of the aspiring students. Department level orientations are organized to apprise the students about the course outcomes, pedagogy to be followed, credits allotted to each paper and scheme of internal assessment so does individual subject teachers. Departments also help the students to choose optional papers by informing them about the outcomes of different Skill Enhancement Courses and Discipline Specific Electives through special orientation sessions. Every year the College conducts stream-wise (Arts/Science/Commerce) orientation sessions to inform the students about Generic Elective options offered by the different departments. The faculty designs lesson plans for their respective papers at the beginning of each semester and submit the same to the IQAC of the College. Lesson Plans are uploaded on the College website. The College evaluates the attainment of Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes at the level of both teachers and students. Academic and Administrative Audits conducted by the institution testify the successful attainment of POs, PSOs and COs. In order to attain the Course Outcomes, workshops, seminars, add-on courses, practicals, field visits etc. are regularly conducted by the College and the departments for the benefit of both the students and teachers. The attainment of the course outcomes is constantly monitored through the department level Student-Faculty Committees and collection and</p>

	<p>analysis of students' feedback. It is noteworthy that students' and parents' feedback on the teaching-learning process followed by the College has been above-average even during the pandemic. Students' understanding of the POs, PSOs and COs are measured and assessed through internal assessment, practicals and end semester examination. On the basis of students' academic performance, meritorious students are felicitated with cash prizes/scholarships. The College thrusts upon instilling among the students employable and entrepreneurial skills in tune with the contemporary demands through add-on skill-based courses, training workshops, internships, research and entrepreneurial opportunities offered by the College through Skill Development Cell, Placement Cell, IIRS-ISRO Outreach Programme and Committee for Collaboration with NPC. Another key indicator of our success in attaining POs and COs is the increasing percentage of students enrolling for higher education in India or abroad and qualifying for competitive examinations like CAT, GRE, GMAT, GATE etc. The number of students securing internships and placements is also witnessing a rising trend which is also registered in All India 5th rank in India Today Ranking 2022. The College's Placement Cell through its placement activities and internship fairs has been instrumental in this achievement.</p>

It is also registered in DELNET to provide books on loan to faculty and students along with online resources. The list of the library books has been placed online. There are several open access resources that are available for students and staff, including the World Digital Library, E-gyankosh, e-PG Pathshala, Internet archive, etc. Links are provided on the College website to access College library as well as Delhi University e-resources. • An updated user-friendly College website has been designed, developed and maintained in-house using Wordpress along with a mobile-friendly version winning DU's Best Website Award in the College category in 2019. • Documents like degrees, certificates and marksheets were sent to the students online during pandemic. • Placement Cell of the College signed up for Coursera for Campus Program which provided free access to around 4000 online courses. • During pandemic College and society events were organized via virtual platforms and online editions of magazines and newsletters were launched. • Online Internship-Cum-Job Fair was held by the Placement Cell. ###### Response:

As a constituent college of Delhi University, ARSD adheres to the prescribed curriculum and academic calendar of the University and ensures effective and timely curriculum delivery.

- Judicious selection of Electives keeping in mind the faculty expertise, students' interests and employability.
- Short-term add-on/certificate/value addition and skill-based courses are offered.
- Specific orientation programmes for different departments/streams, GE, SEC and DSE papers and societies in addition to the general Orientation programme.
- Many research projects are run harnessing student research aptitude.
- The College conducts as well as encourages faculty to participate in FDPs/refreshers/workshops for quality enhancement.
- Ancillary programmes such as camps, field trips, talks, seminars/conferences and workshops are run.
- To match curricular knowledge with practical application, many eminent personalities from various fields are invited to interact with students.
- The College integrates the cross-cutting issues such as gender, environment, human rights, etc., into the curriculum to produce responsible citizens.
- Critical thinking is encouraged through debates, college magazine and newsletters while creativity is fostered through extra-curricular activities.
- During the pandemic, teaching-learning was carried out online through various modes of e-learning.

###### Academic calendar:

The institution adheres to the academic calendar of the University for the conduct of assessment. The dates of commencement and completion of semesters, preparation leave, practical examination, mid-semester break, theory examination and vacations are stated in the Academic Calendar. The students are informed about the Academic Calendar in the beginning of the semester and the same is uploaded on the College website along with syllabus, timetables, assessment processes and lesson plans. The University rules regarding pass percentage, promotion rules, reappearance for improvement and internal assessment are available on the College website, Student Handbook, and Prospectus.

###### Continuous Internal Assessment:

The College ensures that Internal Assessments are organized in a timely, routine, and transparent manner.

- Internal Assessment modalities are fixed by the University and diligently followed by the College.

For the majority of the papers, the internal assessment accounts for 25 marks (10 for assignment, 10 for class tests/projects, 5 for attendance) out of 100 marks.

- Students are assessed through different modes like Quizzes, assignment, tests, projects, presentations or viva.
- After due evaluation of their tests/assignments/projects, feedback and remarks are shared with the students and marks submitted to the Teacher-in-Charge..
- Adequate compensation for ECA and sports attendance is given to eligible students as per university guidelines.
- Internal Assessment Committees are created at the department and College levels to verify and moderate the marks.
- Assessment marks are also uploaded on the College website which the students can access.
- Internal Assessment related grievances are addressed in a time-bound and efficient manner and marks forwarded to the University Examination Branch.
- During the Covid-19 pandemic, the continuous internal assessment process also shifted to an online mode through platforms like G-Suite, MS Teams, Open Source LMS Moodle, WhatsApp, e-mails etc.

## 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

### 1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

#### Response:

ARSD College offers courses as prescribed by the syllabus of the University of Delhi, and as decided on by the Committee of Courses and deliberated upon by University Departments. Faculty members serve on syllabus revision committees to ensure that the syllabus is current and in keeping with contemporary thought processes. The syllabus is formulated and subsequently electives/optionals provided to adhere to codes of professional ethics, gender equity, human values, environmental consciousness and sustainability.

A compulsory course on 'Environmental Studies' is offered to all first-year undergraduates, sensitizing all to the necessity of conservation and holistic ecological practices. In addition, Generic Electives "Biodiversity", "Environmental Biotechnology" are offered by the department of Botany which work towards explaining students the need for reciprocity between nature and human beings.

Skill Enhancement Courses and Generic Elective papers are offered after consultation with students and faculty members to maximize exposure to changing social codes and turn out students in harmony with their surroundings. GE papers like "Women, Power, and Politics" and "Contemporary India: Women and Empowerment" bring to discussion the issues pertaining to gender disparity. Generic papers on Ambedkar and Gandhi address imbalances in representation, marginalization of vulnerable communities, and the importance of an equal society. A GE paper "Individual and Society" exposes students to the issues of gender, caste, race and violence. Papers like "Artificial Intelligence" prepare the students for new-age fields in the professional world.

In addition, various societies of the college like Women Development Cell, NSS, Rangayan, through seminars, workshops, training sessions and talks actively contribute in creating an atmosphere of gender equality by addressing topics like women rights, menstrual hygiene, cyber safety, inclusion of transgenders, etc.

## 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

### 2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

**Response:**

The IQAC of the College endeavors to enhance the learning experience for the students. The faculty regularly uses new and innovative pedagogies using ICT facilities to enhance the quality of teaching and learning.

- The College campus is Wi-Fi-enabled and has 25 projector-fitted classrooms, fully functional Audio-Video room, 2 seminar halls with ICT facilities, 2 well-equipped Committee Rooms, an e-resource centre in the Library, 7 computer labs and browsing centres.
- Teaching fraternity ensures effective curriculum delivery by adopting innovative teaching methods such as group projects, movie screenings, case study, classroom discussions, presentations etc.
- To foster the creative skills of the students, they are encouraged to write for and edit College magazine, society newsletters, and departmental magazines.
- Workshops, training sessions, seminars/conferences/webinars, industrial and laboratory visits are arranged for the students to widen their learning horizons.
- Online quiz platforms like Kahoot, Quizizz and interactive presentation software such as Jamboard, Whiteboard, Mentimeter are used by the faculty.
- Internships, add-on/certificate/value-added/short-term courses, entrepreneurial opportunities and skill development activities are organized to train the students to be industry ready.
- Practical/hands-on training on Tally, R, Excel, LPP etc, are organised to complement the classroom learning.
- IQAC regularly conducts empowerment programmes for teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Students and faculty members have all been provided unique College IDs in order to facilitate interactions.

- Faculty members are routinely involved in the creation of e-content on platforms like MOOCs, e-PG Pathshala, Samalochan, SWAYAM etc. E-content of the lectures are regularly uploaded on the College YouTube channel.
- Adoption of ICT in classrooms has been commended by the student fraternity, as is evident from their feedback.
- The College Library has subscribed to the National Library and Information Service Infrastructure for Scholarly Content, a project of INFLIBNET, which provides remote access to e-resources. It is also registered in Developing Library Network to provide books on loan to faculty as well students along with online resources. The list of all the books available in the Library has been placed online making it easier to locate a book. In addition, there are several open access resources that are available for students and faculty members.
- Pandemic Pursuits:
  - During the pandemic the teaching learning activities were seamlessly transitioned to the online mode through the use of G-Suite, MS Teams, Open Source LMS Moodle and other online platforms like Zoom and Google Meet. Training sessions were organized by the College for the use of these platforms.
  - All faculty members and students have dedicated usernames and access to Google classroom.
  - To inform the students about the conduct of online classes, separate WhatsApp and Telegram groups were made for different subjects and their links were shared on the website. Study material was also shared with the students through these channels.
  - Online science practicals were conducted smoothly via virtual labs like Amrita labs to compensate for the lack of physical exposure to laboratories.
  - As per University guidelines, internal assessment and Online Open Book Examinations (OBE) were conducted.

## 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

#### 2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

**Response:**

The College ensures that Internal Assessment internal/external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient.

- Internal Assessment modalities are fixed by the University of Delhi and diligently followed by the College to ensure continuous monitoring of the student performance and attendance. For the majority of the papers, the internal assessment accounts for 25 marks out of 100 marks. The 25 marks are in turn divided into three components - 10 marks for written assignments, 10 marks for class tests/projects and 5 marks for attendance.
- The scheme of internal assessment is communicated to the students through the College Prospectus. This is further impressed upon during the College and Departmental Orientation sessions.
- Students, for their internal assessment in each paper, are assessed through different modes like Quizzes, assignment, tests, projects, presentations or open book assessment. In the language courses, regular classroom activities like extempore and role play are conducted to improve language proficiency, contributing to their internal assessment.
- **The College monitors the fair conduct of continuous assessment at three different levels.**
  - At the first level i.e. the subject teachers, after due evaluation of tests/assignments/projects, share feedback and remarks with the students. Adequate compensation for ECA and sports

attendance is given to eligible students, as per University of Delhi guidelines. Grievances, if any, are resolved in the class itself. The faculty members duly compile the internal assessment for their respective papers and submit the same to the Teacher-in-Charge of the department. Thereafter, assessment marks are uploaded on the College portal which the students can verify and discuss with the respective teachers if there still are any issues.

- At the second level, each department sets up a moderation committee to counter-check the Internal Assessment (IA) marks and ensure their correctness and fairness. Student grievances and other discrepancies related to compilation of the internal assessment are handled at this level as well.
- Finally, at the College level, the entire Internal Evaluation process is facilitated by a College Monitoring Committee which manages the entire process in a fair and time bound manner and also redresses any grievances that may arise at this stage.
- After satisfactory redressal of all grievances, students are asked to verify their internal assessment marks.
- The Principal is the final authority in all internal assessment related matters and ensures adherence to all rules and guidelines as set by the University.
- Thereafter, the internal assessment marks are carefully uploaded on the designated link of the Examination branch of the University.
- During the Covid-19 pandemic, not only teaching but also the continuous internal assessment process had to shift to an online mode through platforms like G-Suite, MS Teams, Open Source LMS Moodle, WhatsApp, e-mails etc. The College made conscious efforts to ensure that the transition to the online mode was seamless and efficient.

#### Response:

The College offers 17 undergraduate courses and 4 postgraduate courses, apart from various add-on courses under the Choice Based Credit System, Learning Outcomes based Curriculum Framework and New Education Policy Framework. The College faculty is actively involved in framing University Syllabi for their respective subjects/papers. Teachers regularly attend subject specific meetings conducted by the respective departments at the beginning of every semester to discuss the updation of the Course Curriculum.

The course outcomes as mentioned in the syllabus are uploaded on the College website. The information about courses offered is published in the College prospectus for the benefit of the aspiring students. Department level orientations are organized to apprise the students about the course outcomes, pedagogy to be followed, credits allotted to each paper and scheme of internal assessment so does individual subject teachers. Departments also help the students to choose optional papers by informing them about the

outcomes of different Skill Enhancement Courses and Discipline Specific Electives through special orientation sessions.

Every year the College conducts stream-wise (Arts/Science/Commerce) orientation sessions to inform the students about Generic Elective options offered by the different departments.

The faculty designs lesson plans for their respective papers at the beginning of each semester and submit the same to the IQAC of the College. Lesson Plans are uploaded on the College website.

The College evaluates the attainment of Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes at the level of both teachers and students. Academic and Administrative Audits conducted by the institution testify the successful attainment of POs, PSOs and COs.

In order to attain the Course Outcomes, workshops, seminars, add-on courses, practicals, field visits etc. are regularly conducted by the College and the departments for the benefit of both the students and teachers.

The attainment of the course outcomes is constantly monitored through the department level Student-Faculty Committees and collection and analysis of students' feedback. It is noteworthy that students' and parents' feedback on the teaching-learning process followed by the College has been above-average even during the pandemic.

Students' understanding of the POs, PSOs and COs are measured and assessed through internal assessment, practicals and end semester examination. On the basis of students' academic performance, meritorious students are felicitated with cash prizes/scholarships.

The College thrusts upon instilling among the students employable and entrepreneurial skills in tune with the contemporary demands through add-on/certificate/value-added skill-based courses, training workshops, internships, research and entrepreneurial opportunities offered by the College through Skill Development Cell, Placement Cell, IIRS-ISRO Outreach Programme and Committee for Collaboration with NPC.

Another key indicator of our success in attaining POs and COs is the increasing percentage of students enrolling for higher education in India or abroad and qualifying for competitive examinations like CAT, GRE, GMAT, GATE etc. The number of students securing internships and placements is also witnessing a rising trend.

### 3.4 Extension Activities

**3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.**

**Response:**

Led by its student members and executive, several College societies are actively involved in bringing about social change.

**National Service Scheme:**

The ARSD unit of NSS has organized over 600 events (2017-22). With the Connecting Dreams Foundation, a government school was adopted in 2017. Through “Sevadeep,” volunteers run several programmes in an adopted slum. The Unit organizes free health checkup camps in the slum and in College. They collaborate with different NGOs to provide hands-on learning to disadvantaged sections. During the pandemic, volunteers distributed essentials, procured oxygen cylinders, and organized more than 200 webinars and workshops.

**Enactus ARSD:**

Begun in 2017, Enactus is part of an international student initiative that believes that **Entrepreneurial Action** for others creates a better world for **Us** all. The ARSD Chapter has been empowering underprivileged communities, running 5 projects and an annual exhibition-cum-sale.

**The Women Development Cell** through talks and workshops sensitizes the College community in a holistic manner.

**The Equal Opportunity Cell** promotes inclusivity, ensuring barrier-free access to all. From 2017-22, the Cell organized several events and sensitization programmes to raise awareness and inspire the fight for equal and fair representation. Through Help the Blind Foundation, Hong Kong, the Equal Opportunity Cell has obtained a total scholarship of Rs. 60,000 (Rs.10,000 each to six visually challenged students).

**Rangayan:** The College Dramatics Society stages social issues through its performances, collaborating with other Societies to highlight social inequity. Its members also organize workshops for slum children.

**The Eco Club** works to raise awareness about environmental concerns, undertakes tree planting initiatives and runs other public-interest campaigns related to clean, green methods. It also recycles waste paper.

**The College** has conducted a tree census of the campus, an Annual Green Audit and Energy Audit. It also has an MoU with NGO Jagruti to recycle waste. The College has signed an MoU with the **Society for Disability and Rehabilitation Studies** to aid the differently-abled students of all the colleges of South Campus, Delhi University. Motorized wheelchairs, motorized scooties and Apple MacBook Air laptops were distributed to our needy students by the Society. During the Lockdown, the **College crowdfunded** the MA fees of an ex-student, Chandan Kumar, whose family had been threatened with loss of livelihood. Our distinguished alumnus, Mr. Gaurav Mohan Sharma, Director, Alvaro Group, generously donated four oxygen concentrators—one for the College and three to the University of Delhi during the pandemic.

**The North East Welfare Committee** works at integrating the campus and sensitizing the College body to the socio-cultural situation in the North East. It organizes the popular Rainbow Festival that sees widespread participation from students across the University.

**Star College Scheme:** Outreach programmes are conducted among nearby government schools to familiarize them with scientific experimentation and provide a new perspective on the practical applicability of science.

**Unnat Bharat Abhiyan:** The College has participated in MHRD's flagship UBA programme. Under this, the College has adopted 5 villages and working for their development. During the pandemic, students ran awareness campaigns and distributed masks in these villages.

- On World AIDS Day, Best Red Ribbon Club award was conferred on our College by National AIDS Control Organization.
- ARSD Enactus got Poster Presentation Selection in Enactus World Cup 2019 and has been a recipient of KPMG Business Ethics Grant 2020 by KPMG for its extension activities.
- On the occasion of 150th birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi ARSD was recognised for its contribution towards Popularizing Gandhian Ideology by Gandhi Bhawan, Delhi University.
- ARSD participated in Swachhata Ranking and got the award of Swachhata Action Plan and Institution by Mahatma Gandhi National Council of Rural Education, Department of Higher Education, Ministry of Education, GOI.

All the classrooms are furnished with Wi-Fi/LAN facilities. For inclusivity of differently abled, facilities like ramps, wheelchairs, tactile pathways, customized washrooms and teaching aids in the library are available. The College has 1024 laptops, 255 desktops, 7 computer labs, and browsing centres.

Apart from academics, ARSD provides ample opportunities in the fields of sports and other co-curricular activities which work towards holistic development of the students. The grooming and the facilities provided at the College has led our students to win accolades at various platforms.

- For swimming the students avail the facilities at Talkatora stadium which is supported with membership fees by the College.
- Professional coaches are appointed for training the students
- There is a Sports Board with the Director of Physical education as its convener to augment and maintain sports facilities
- On an average 500 students use the sports facilities available in the College on any given day.
- Sports Day is celebrated every year giving recognitions to the sports achievers as well as organizing sports activities for the staff and students
- To optimize the uses of the sports facilities, the College organizes inter/intra-college tournaments and also diverts them for philanthropic purposes.

We have 15 societies to suit different interests of the students. To augment this, Photography Society, Finance and Investment Cell, Ambedkar Study Circle and Enactus were introduced in the assessment period. The Cultural Society too expanded creating Saarang, Kalasree, A-Crew Unit and Stellar. Eminent personalities from different fields are invited to groom the skills of the students. Annual cultural fest TIDE is celebrated in the college ground which provides platform to the students to showcase their talents in various fields.

## 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

### 4.2.1 Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), subscription to e-resources, amount spent on purchase of books, journals and per day usage of library

#### Response:

The College has a two-storey, fully automated and Wi-Fi-enabled library which has 1,15,769 books and 526 hardbound journals, and subscriptions to 30 journals and 6000 e-journals along with a large collection of reference sources, i.e. encyclopaedias, dictionaries, atlases, yearbooks, handbooks, among others. It has a seating capacity for about 100 students along with a separate reading space for 30 faculty members. It has a Students' Aid Fund section and an e-learning centre. In the assessment period (2017-22) Rs. 32.8 lakhs were spent on purchase of books, journals and e-journals. The Library also received books as gifts from various organizations and faculty members. The Library uses SOUL 3.0 Integrated Library Management Software to automate housekeeping operations. Library software facilitates OPAC functions, enabling users to access their required documents. The College Library also subscribes to INFLIBNET- NLIST database and is a member of Developing Library Network (DELNET) to provide books from India and abroad on loan to Library users. DELNET also provides articles of the journals on demand. The College Library is equipped with laptops and desktops which are available to access the E-resources of DULS, NLIST project, DELNET and other open access resources while 2 Pcs are available for Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC). The Library also has reading software, ear-pronotes, thinkpads and two computers with installation of JAWS software for the visually challenged.

More than 800 users, including students as well as faculty members, visited the College Library and almost 11,000 books were issued in 2021-22. The College Library provides internship opportunities to students of Delhi Library Association and IGNOU. The Library staffs attended online conferences, workshops, seminars and lectures to keep themselves updated. The Library staff is also engaged in writing and publishing research papers in Journals and conferences.

#### Library Pandemic Initiatives:

During the pandemic, Library staff remained connected with faculty members and students through various mediums and met the information needs of the user community.

- University of Delhi subscribed to a large number of e-resources and provided the access of the same to its affiliated colleges.
- The list of all the books available in the Library has been placed online.
- There are several open access resources that are available for students and faculty members including the World Digital Library, E-gyankosh, e-PG Pathshala, Internet archive, Shodhganga, among others.

- There are 59 laser printers, 3 photocopiers, 1 FAX machine, 4 Scanners, 6 LCD, 33 projectors, 61 CCTV cameras and 1 Electronic Notice Board placed in the College foyer.
- During this period 98 computers with latest configuration including Intel® Core (TM) i7, RAM-16GB, SSD-256 GB, HDD-1 TB have been installed in computer labs and the whole campus has been made wi-fi enabled.
- College has a server room and power backup to support IT facilities.
- The College has bandwidth of 10 Gbps which is the highest limit provided by NKN, which supplies internet to all the colleges of Delhi University.
- Audio-visual studio has been formed to facilitate ICT-enabled teaching-learning.
- Under Star College Scheme, e-content has been developed by faculty members and lectures and reading material have been uploaded on college website and Youtube channel.
- Complete digitization of student records and Library holdings has been done.
- All the forms like leave, medical, LTC, reimbursement, etc. are put online.
- Seating arrangements during exams are uploaded on the website a day before.
- All the examination related notices and information are circulated well in advance through the website.
- Assessment marks and attendance are uploaded on the website.
- An updated user-friendly College website has been designed, developed and maintained in-house using Wordpress along with a mobile-friendly version winning DU's Best Website Award in the College category in 2019.
- Along with College website, Enactus, Placement Cell, library, alumni association and Star College have their own website.
- Societies also run their social media handles along with the media cell of the College.

##### Pandemic Initiatives

- Students and faculty members were provided unique College ids in order to facilitate seamless virtual interactions during pandemic.
- Lectures and reading material were uploaded on the college website and Youtube channel.

- All official information was circulated via Whatsapp and Telegram groups apart from the website.
- The College Library provides remote access of e-resources and provides books on loan to faculty and students.
- The list of all the library books has been placed online.
- Online links were provided on college website to access Delhi University e-resources.
- Online science practicals were conducted smoothly via virtual labs.
- Faculty members used different modules and software tools to make online teaching effective like Mentimeter, Kahoot, Quizizz, Google Classroom, Microsoft Teams, LMS Moodles.
- Documents were sent to the students online to avoid their visit to college during pandemic.
- Live videos related to the OBE and Delhi University Undergraduate admission process were uploaded on the College Website and circulated through Telegram and Whatsapp groups.

## 5.4 Alumni Engagement

The College has a registered Alumni Association and wishes to involve its alumni in a meaningful manner for the benefit of the students and the institution. It has its own website. The College holds an annual Alumni Meet, **Confluentia** that serves as a forum to celebrate alumni achievements, connect and network, and for the alumni to inspire the College body. College also confers distinguished alumni awards.

The Alumni contribute to the corporate life of the institution in the following essential ways:

**Quality enhancement:** Members of the alumni serve on the highest quality enhancement body of the College, the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). Currently Mr. Parag Bhushan, an Entrepreneur, is the alumni representative. Dr. V.K. Arora, an alumnus and retired faculty member of the College, also serves on the Committee.

**Mentorship and Career counselling:** Alumni participate in talks and events, and organize workshops to provide a hands-on learning experience and industrial exposure to current students. They also provide career advice and counselling. Rangayan has a longstanding tradition of an alumni performance during the annual theatre festival.

**Financial Support:** Alumni contribute to scholarships and bursaries of the institution, aiding meritorious students in need. Every year Rs. 50,000/- per annum is contributed by the Alumni Association towards freships. An alumnus, Mr. Uday Turuga has given an amount of Rs. 1,00,000 to the College as endowment fund in the memory of Late Dr K. C. Trikha, a superannuated faculty member of the Department of Chemistry, ARSD College, to be awarded to the best student of BSc Hons Chemistry. Gaurav Mohan Sharma, a distinguished alumnus and Director, Alvaro Group, has also donated an endowment fund of Rs. 3,00,000 towards 3 scholarships of Rs. 5000/- to needy and meritorious students of BA Hons Economics.

**Building Community:** An important milestone was achieved by the Alumni Association last year by releasing the first edition of the Alumni Directory. The Directory will be beneficial in rekindling the bonding and alliances among the alumni.

**Crisis Control:** During the pandemic, Mr. Gaurav Mohan Sharma, Director, Alvaro Group, a distinguished alumnus, donated four oxygen concentrators—one for the College and three to the University of Delhi. The College offered a full fee waiver to 11 students who had lost their parents to COVID-19 in collaboration with Gargi and Vidya Prakash Foundation through the efforts of our alumnus, Mr. Rajnikant, General Secretary, Alumni Association.

**Improving College Perception:** The distinguished alumni of ARSD, holding positions of eminence and placed all across the globe are spreading messages of sensitivity, integrity, good citizenship and solidarity with great efficacy. The College is extremely proud of the accomplishments of our alumni like Prof. Mul Chanda Sharma (Professor, DU and vice chancellor-National Law University, Bhopal and Central University of Haryana), Himmat Singh Negi (theatre) and Rajkumar Rao (actor) among others.

- Each department has a coordinator/ TIC who is appointed for a year on a rotational basis.

- The Student Union plays an active role in the decision making of the College.

#### Response:

The College is a constituent College of the University of Delhi and diligently follows the underlying Act and Statutes. The College follows UGC rules and regulations with regard to appointments, teaching, admissions, examination and research in higher education.

- The College is governed by an experienced Governing Body, which is constituted as follows: Chairperson, Treasurer, Members of the Trust (Sanatan Dharma Sabha), Secretary (the Principal), University representatives and representatives from both the teaching and the non-teaching staff of the College.
- The Principal is the academic and administrative Head of the institution.
- The Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the College, with Principal as the Chairperson and a senior faculty member as the Coordinator and representations from the teaching and non-teaching staff, students, academia and industry experts and College alumni, aims at maintaining the scholastic and co-scholastic quality standards in teaching as well as in administration.
- The Administration of the College comprises the Bursar, Public Information Officer, Liaison Officer, Administrative Officer (AO) and Section Officers (Administration and Accounts) who are

assisted by senior and junior assistants and other support staff.

- The College has a Staff Council headed by the Principal as the Chairman and an elected Secretary. The Staff Council functions through various committees with active involvement of elected convenors, members from the teaching staff and the students.
- The College has several specialized cells/units such as NSS, NCC, E- Cell, Placement Cell, Skill Hub etc., to provide value addition in different aspects of higher education.
- The College has 13 departments, the functioning of which is the responsibility of the coordinator/TIC, who is appointed on a rotational basis. The TIC conducts regular departmental meetings to take decisions regarding scholastic and co-scholastic activities in the department.
- The College has a well stacked library and access to several e-resources and e-databases for the academic and research enrichment of the staff and students. The library is looked after by the library committee, library in-charge/ librarian, a professional assistant and other support staff.

The college facilitates optimum utilization of institutional capabilities for the successful deployment of its perspective plans.

- College-wide preparations are underway for the implementation of the New Education Policy 2020.
- The College strengthens the research activities among faculty and students through initiatives like PRABODH, Vidya Vistar, MoUs with various academic research partners, Research and Development Cell and Central Instrumentation Facility. As per the NIRF Ranking 2022, the College secured 7th rank and the Research Publication Score of the College was the highest among all Delhi University Colleges.
- Successful completion of several add-on/certificate/value added/vocational courses and introduction of several others.
- Efforts are in progress to launch the multidisciplinary bilingual research journal.
- Conduct of regular FDPs, Refresher Courses, national/international conferences, seminars/webinars.
- Intensifying efforts towards an energy efficient and green campus.
- Strengthen Industry-academia collaboration and encouraging alumni engagement in the College activities.
- Strengthen the already robust Institutional Outreach activities with active participation of College societies through linkages with the communities, NGOs, Self-Help Groups etc..
- Constant upgradation of ICT facilities in the College.

### **Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff:**

The College ensures that promotions are awarded in a time bound manner to the eligible applicants.

- The college follows all UGC regulations- Career Advancement Scheme (CAS - 2010 and 2018) / Merit Promotion Scheme (MPS)- for the promotion of the teaching staff.
- The teacher submits an annual self-appraisal report in the prescribed Annual Performance Assessment Report (APAR) proforma at the end of every academic year along with all necessary documentary evidence. The teachers are assessed on the basis of: academic performance and contributions, research activities, administrative engagements, personal development and participation in students' co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- The APAR submission is done through the Teacher-in-Charge, who verifies the claims.
- A Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) proforma is filled by the teachers after completing the stipulated number of years for promotion to the next level. The PBAS, along with all the documentary evidence, is also verified by the TIC.
- A committee has been constituted by the College for the purpose which conducts a preliminary screening of the PBAS forms submitted by the teachers as per the CAS requirements. The committee then prepares a summarized report for submission to the screening/selection committee.
- A screening committee evaluates the performance of Teachers on the basis of the report submitted for promotion to different levels as per rules.
- For promotion to Associate Professor/Professor, assessment is done through interviews conducted by a duly constituted selection committee.
- A total of 198 teachers were promoted at various levels:
  - Academic Level 10 to 11: 88
  - Academic Level 11 to 12: 67
  - Academic Level 12 to 13A: 27
  - Academic Level 13A to Academic Level 14: 16
- The Annual Performance Appraisal is prepared for the administrative staff along the same lines as that conducted for the Central Government Civil Services Staff.
- The performance of the employee is assessed annually in the APAR.
- In the first stage the Reporting Officer records his assessment which is reviewed by a superior Officer, and finally the report goes to the Accepting Authority.

**Response:**

The College follows the rules and procedures as per General Financial Rules (GFR) 2017. The annual budget of Revenue and Capital Expenditure is prepared by the College and approved by the University Grants Commission (UGC).

- The major sources of the College's funds are:
  - grants received from UGC and fees collected from students
  - research grants for research and innovation Projects by agencies like DBT Star College Scheme, UGC, CSIR, ICSSR, DST-SERB and DU
  - fees from add-on courses offered by the College
  - faculty development programmes, conferences and national and international seminars
  - conduct of SOL classes and examinations
  - self-financing course offered by the Computer Science department
  - conduct of various competitive exams
  - sponsorships for conducting department/societies/College level functions/events/festivals
  - aid, grants and donations from non-government bodies, alumni and philanthropists.
- Non financial assistance was provided by Delhi Metro (for construction of College facade) and ICICI bank (for construction of rain water harvesting unit).
- Optimal utilization of resources and funds is ensured as follows.
  - paying salaries and other allowances to the employees
  - purchasing books, magazines, journals and other digital resources for College library
  - purchase of laboratory apparatus, chemicals and consumables as well as organisation of academic and society events.
  - awarding scholarships/ fee concessions/ book aids to meritorious and deserving students.
  - infrastructural development of the College like construction, maintenance, modification and renovation of its facilities.
  - sharing infrastructural facilities for running the University Evaluation Center, learner support center for conducting classes for SOL and IGNOU, competitive examinations and sports tournaments.
  - providing research grants to the deserving project proposals submitted by the College faculty under In-House Interdisciplinary Research and Innovation Scheme-PRABODH
- Most of the financial transactions in the College are conducted through the Public Financial Management System (PFMS).
  - All major purchases in the College are decided by duly constituted purchase committees and mandatorily done through Government e-Marketplace (GeM) portal to ensure transparency, efficiency and speed in public procurement.
  - The College has an efficient Accounts department headed by the Administrative Officer (AO) and the Section Officer (SO) to supervise the financial and accounting matters of the College.
  - Internal Audit - The Principal and the Bursar of the College projects, allocates and approves funds to different departments/societies out of the student society fund for organizing

various programmes and cultural activities. The College Governing Body monitors all major expenses. Audit of the annual financial statements is done by an internal auditor who is duly approved by the Governing Body and a statutory auditor who is jointly approved by the Governing Body and the University of Delhi.

- External Audit- The Governing Body has a mechanism of external audit. The College regularly conducts the external audit and is up-to-date as of now.
- Audit Objections- Any minor errors of omissions and commissions, pointed out by the audit team, are immediately corrected/rectified and precautionary steps are taken to avoid recurrence of such errors in future. However, no major objection has been reported by the auditors.

- **Research and Academic Initiatives**

As per the NIRF Ranking 2022, the College secured 7th rank and the Research Publication Score of the College was the highest among all Delhi University Colleges.

- 11 Innovation, 7 Star Innovative and 41 In-House interdisciplinary projects under DBT STAR College Schemes, involving over 400 students culminating into several publications in scopus indexed journals.
- 17 Research Labs providing research/ internship opportunities
- Faculty and students are motivated to publish academic research papers in scopus indexed journals.
- 4 FDPs, 2 refresher courses, several national/international conferences and over 600 academic events have been organized in both online and offline mode.
- Interdisciplinary Research and Innovation Projects Scheme, PRABODH, and Central Instrumentation Facility are steps towards establishment of the Research and Development Cell in the College.
- To foster research environment, the College has signed MoUs with two colleges in

Uttarakhand under the Vidya Vistar Scheme, Netaji Subhas University of Technology and Shri Ramswaroop Memorial University, Barabanki.

- **Student Enrichment Initiatives**

- MoU with National Productivity Council, GoI, to facilitate capacity building and entrepreneurial activities through add-on courses.
- The College as a network institute of the Indian Institute of Remote Sensing, Dehradun, a constituent unit of ISRO, GoI, has offered 6 courses.
- The Placement Cell of the College collaborated with Coursera for Campus Program, which provided free access to around 4000 online courses.
- The Skill Development and Entrepreneurship Cell of the College has signed 31 MoUs with various institutions to offer opportunities for skill upgradation through various courses.
- Field visits and academic trips are regularly organized.
- The IQAC conducted Export Development Programme, workshops, Entrepreneurship Awareness Camp, Counseling sessions and short term e-courses.
- The College provides internship opportunities in science and library science courses.

- **Teaching-Learning Pedagogy**

- The faculty believes in using innovative, participative, experiential and interactive pedagogies through the use of ICT tools and technologies. The College has a fully functional recording studio, easy access to e-resources/journals and a repository of uploaded lectures. The pandemic saw a shift from physical to the virtual mode of teaching-learning, through platforms like G-Suite, MS Teams, LMS Moodle and Zoom. Webinars/workshops were organized on Zoom and Facebook to train the students and staff in this regard.
- The IQAC reviews the efficacy of the teaching-learning process through assessment of the lesson plans, Student-Faculty Committees, Mentoring Groups and Feedback Mechanism. The Student-Faculty Committees meet regularly to discuss scholastic and co-scholastic areas. The feedback is duly analyzed and is used in planning and executing the development plans of the institution.

#### **BEST PRACTICE-I:**

#### **Research-Oriented Teaching Learning Environment**

ARSD has a strong undergraduate research culture that has been nurtured by the premium placed on Quality Education, Holistic Learning, and Academic Excellence in the College's Vision and Mission. The College aims to provide a conducive research environment and facilitates optimum utilization of institutional capabilities to encourage research initiatives by the students and the faculty and promote out-of-the-box thinking and practical innovations to real world problems.

- 11 Innovation, 7 Star Innovative and 41 In-House interdisciplinary projects under DBT STAR College Schemes have been completed involving over 400 students. This has culminated into several publications in scopus indexed journals.
- Prof. Sunita Bhagat (Chemistry) has a patent to her credit.
- Our faculty members and students are involved actively in research writings and research projects funded by agencies like UGC, DST-SERB, ICSSR, CSIR, DBT etc. 727 research articles, 288 books/chapters in books and papers in national/ international conference proceedings were published by the faculty members during the last five years.
- 4 week-long FDPs, 2 refreshers, several national/international conferences and over 600 institutional academic events in both online and offline mode. The conference proceedings have been published in reputed scopus indexed journals/ books.
- Over 200 faculty members have been involved in several Research Projects.
- Teachers have participated in 1128 refresher courses, workshops, orientations, FDPs, and induction programmes.
- An analysis of the College's performance in the NIRF surveys from 2017-22 in terms of TLR and RPC parameters aptly demonstrates both the consistently high scores achieved and College's investment in research and professional practice. ARSD College is the top rank holder (as per NIRF 2022 rankings) in terms of Research Publications amongst all DU Colleges.
- The College is contemplating launching the Research and Development Cell to foster its research ecosystem. In-house Interdisciplinary Research and Innovation Projects Scheme, PRABODH, and Central Instrumentation Facility (CIF) are initiatives in this regard.
- Under the Vidya Vistar Scheme of the University of Delhi, the College has signed MoUs with two colleges in Uttarakhand under the Scheme for promoting capacity building and institutional collaboration.
- ARSD college has signed an MoU with Netaji Subhas University of Technology and Shri Ramswaroop Memorial University, Barabanki to foster the research environment and provide more opportunities for students and faculty for enhancing their technical skills and research temperament. Collaborative research is in process under these MoUs.
- Twenty six of our faculty members are guiding over 70 research scholars at Post Doc/PhD/MPhil levels and Research Fellows.
- The College has 17 Research Labs to provide for research/ internship opportunities to our students and those from other Colleges/Universities

**The problems encountered and resources required to implement the practice are:**

- Adequate funding and additional infrastructural facilities are required.

- The research activities suffered a setback due to disruptions caused by the pandemic.

**BEST PRACTICE-II**

**Institutional Social Responsibility and Outreach Activities**

The principles of Equity and Inclusivity are built into the foundations of the institution. The College through its ISR activities aims to nurture in its stakeholders a sense of duty towards the less fortunate and the marginalized sections of the society by addressing issues like education, health, women empowerment, environment, etc. thereby, realizing the Sustainable Development Goals of the United Nations.

- NSS ARSD, regularly organizes sensitization programs, donation drives, free health check-ups, awareness programs, Blood Donation Camps, Cleanliness Drives, disaster relief during national emergencies, apart from participating in the governmental initiatives such as SVEEP, NSS week, Swachta Pakhwara etc.,. NSS has adopted Sriram JJ Cluster under the initiative “SEVADEEP”, in collaboration with Connecting Dreams Foundation. Volunteers interacted with SDMC officials addressing water and sanitation issues of that slum.
- Enactus ARSD, through its projects, has impacted more than 1500 lives and created 8 entrepreneurs.
- The Women Development Cell empowers students by creating awareness about socio-political, cultural and legal issues through events like annual 10-day Self-Defence Training Workshop in collaboration with Delhi Police, gender sensitization workshops and interactive sessions with eminent resource persons.
- The Equal Opportunity Cell works to promote inclusivity on Campus by ensuring barrier-free access to all. The Cell, in collaboration with Help the Blind Foundation, Hong Kong, has been providing financial assistance worth Rs.10,000/- each to 6 visually-challenged students. The College distributed motorized wheelchairs, scooties, and Apple MacBook Air laptops to differently-abled students of Delhi University as part of its MoU with SDRS.
- The College Dramatics Society stages social issues through its plays and nukkad natak. Rangayan organized street plays and a Theatre Training Workshop for the children of the slums.
- The Eco Club works to raise awareness about environmental concerns, undertakes tree planting initiatives and runs other public-interest campaigns related to clean, green methods.
- The North-East Welfare Committee aims at seamless integration of the students from the North East.
- Under the Star College Scheme, outreach programmes are conducted in the nearby government schools in order to familiarize them with experimental methods in Chemistry and Physics.

Over the last 5 years, the College has successfully completed 46 certificate/value-added/add-on courses. These endeavors continued with full vigour even during the pandemic times.

- The College with support from MoMSME has established a Technology Business Incubator with the main aim to support the spirit of entrepreneurship and a zeal for leadership and progressive business ideas among students. Under the aegis of IQAC, these cells have conducted several programs.
- As a network institute of the Indian Institute of Remote Sensing, Dehradun, a constituent unit of the Indian Space Research Organization (ISRO), Department of Space, Govt. of India, the College has offered 6 add-on courses.
- DBT STAR College has helped increase interdisciplinary interactions and created a research and collaborative atmosphere amongst the faculty members and students, whereby students are encouraged to opt for research as a career option. Students also got exposure to industrial training programs.
- The Skill Development and Entrepreneurship cell of the College has been set up with an objective of improving entrepreneurial and professional skills of the students. The cell offers add-on courses, training programmes under the PM Yuva Yojana and workshops and courses on vocational skills in respect of which it has signed 31 MoUs with various institutions of prominence.
- In collaboration with the National Institute for Entrepreneurship and Small Business Development, Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship, Government of India, the College organised a 5-day Entrepreneurship Awareness Camp which focused on making the students self-reliant and self-employed. IQAC, ARSD College in collaboration with NIESBUD organized a 1-week Faculty Development Programme on “Entrepreneurship, Motivation and Leadership” to train the faculty in taking entrepreneurial initiatives and inculcate the same in their students.
- The college is associated with FutureSkills Prime jointly owned by the Ministry of Electronics & IT, GoI and NASSCOM.
- The College has 17 Research Labs to provide for research/ internship opportunities to our students and those from other Colleges/Universities
- The primary objective of the Placement Cell is to provide job and internship opportunities to students. It also organizes workshops and seminars on career related matters. The Cell organizes a Job and Internship Fair annually; the fair was organized in an online mode during pandemic. The Placement Cell of the College signed up for Coursera for Campus Program which provided free

access to around 4000 online courses from leading universities. More than 2800 students registered for this program.

- An MoU was signed between Atma Ram Sanatan Dharma College (University of Delhi) and National Productivity Council (NPC), an autonomous organization under the Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade (DPIIT), Ministry of Commerce & Industry, Govt. of India to Develop & conduct Capacity Building Programs for Aspiring Entrepreneurs through specifically designed course curriculum. An online training program on ‘Advanced IT Technologies’ has successfully trained the students in the most in-demand IT domains such as Blockchain, AI-ML, Robotics and Hyperledger etc.
- The IQAC of the College launched the In-house Interdisciplinary Research and Innovation Projects Scheme, PRABODH and the Central Instrumentation Facility. The aim of the in-house research and innovation projects scheme- PRABODH, is to promote the research culture in the College and encourage the involvement of teachers and students in research initiatives in areas that go beyond the curriculum boundaries to address real life challenges faced by the society, the nation and the world. The aim of CIF is to build, enhance and provide basic instrumentation facilities to cater the needs of the stakeholders.
- The College is contemplating launching the Research and Development Cell to foster its research ecosystem. PRABODH and CIF are initiatives in this regard
- The College has an active dramatics society, Rangayan, which organizes an annual 3-day theatre festival titled “Rangshirsh Jaidev Natya Samaroh” and offers production-oriented certificate course on theatre techniques. Rangayan encourages theatre enthusiasts and leaves them with an enriching experience of theatre. Rangayan opens exciting vistas for its members as many of them might like to enter diverse fields of film industry. It’s a learning platform for students to understand the plot development, direction, choreography, costume design, music and most importantly working collaboratively with the juniors, seniors and famous theatre directors. Students, thus get acquainted with various aspects, methods and techniques of theatre productions. These workshops have been instrumental in placing these theater aspirants in appropriate jobs.
- Enactus ARSD provides a platform for budding social entrepreneurs to hone their entrepreneurial skills to bring about a positive change in the lives of the underprivileged sections of the society. Upholding the sustainable development goals, through its initiatives and training, the student volunteers plan and execute activities under various projects catering to different social needs of the society to validate the spirit of #weallwin.
- The NCC wing of the College motivates and prepares the aspiring students for joining the armed forces by providing them training- on campus and off-campus and various other opportunities.
- NSS endeavours to imbibe the spirit of social work among the students, which they may pursue as a career option. 16 volunteers completed the Swachh Bharat Summer Internship Programme organized by the collaboration of Ministry of Sports and Youth Affairs, Ministry of Drinking Water and Sanitation and Ministry of Resource Development Rural Area, Leadership.
- Creative writing and Content writing workshops organised for different languages have encouraged many budding writers in the pursuit of their passion.
- Different societies of the College like NSS, NCC, Finance and Investment Cell, Fine Arts and Crafts Society, Photography and Cultural society are actively engaged in inculcating leadership skills, organization and management capabilities and team spirit among the students as a step towards preparing them for prospective job roles and requirements. Specific workshops/ certificate courses are organized by the societies to hone their creative skills.
- The college has a fully functional recording studio to enhance the online teaching learning process and assist in organising student-centric activities.

## 5. CONCLUSION

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### **Additional Information :**

ARSD focuses on mental wellbeing of all its stakeholders. Counsellor in campus and mentoring system in place ensure the well-being of the staff and students. In addition, the IQAC has organized almost 50 webinars on the subjects related to mental welfare, 3 counselling sessions and FDP for students, staff and faculty in collaboration with Zyego, three Web Concerts on Facebook Live and online counselling during lockdown, safeguarding their emotional health. College, every year, celebrates International Yoga Day, organised three-day yoga camp with the ministry of AYUSH, and many online yoga sessions contributing to the same.

The College has students from every corner of the country and miniscule portion from outside India creating a decent student diversity. The male-female ratio is around 1.3:1, with the percentage of female students on the rise since 2017 (over 10% increase). The College offers 1% relaxation to women candidates in admission. ARSD is one of the few DU colleges which work towards inclusion of transgender into main stream by organising talks to sensitize the student body towards their struggles and inviting them to share their first-hand experiences.

Construction and renovation of the parking area for the College staff and students, beautification and renovation of the College gate, and construction of bore-well was carried out with the help of DMRC while the rain water harvesting unit was constructed by ICICI Bank.

Even before NEP, faculty ran value added courses for the students without any monetary incentive, a noteworthy step.

ARSD was made the Cluster Head of 11 colleges of the University of Delhi to provide observations, suggestions and insights on the proposed concept of Higher Education Commission of India as envisioned by NEP 2020. Online meetings were held with the member colleges and after due discussions and deliberations the document was prepared.

ARSD Youth Conclave, a mega inter-college event was initiated by English Debating Society and film festival 'Tamasha' by Film Appreciation Society which have become annual events now. Book Club, under the aegis of English Association, provides platform to interact with writers and discuss books.

### **Concluding Remarks :**

ARSD is a constituent College of the esteemed University of Delhi functioning as per the rules and regulations mandated by the UGC with regard to appointments, teaching, admissions, examination and research in higher education. ARSD has an effective IQAC that strives to ensure constant upgradation in all institutional processes and the optimization of all resources at hand. The IQAC carves out an Annual Plan at the beginning of each session and focuses on the overall development of the College. Over the last five years, the Plans have centered on infrastructure development, augmentation of teaching-learning processes, expansion of research and innovation, organization of faculty empowerment programmes and training sessions for staff, deepening stakeholder engagement, administrative reforms, greater digitization, industry-institution linkages and collaborations, offering a larger variety of value-added/certificate/skill-enhancing courses, inclusivity, ISR activities and environmental measures. IQAC also assured the effective and seamless teaching-learning during

lockdown and took many initiatives to cope up with unprecedented situation. Strong research culture and extensive ISR have been among the best practices of the institution.

The College has 13 departments catering to the multi-disciplinary academic needs and over 20 societies/cells for the holistic development of the students. The maintained and updated physical and IT infrastructure smoothens teaching-learning process and encourages research culture. The College organises sports and cultural activities/competitions in the campus for the overall development of the students such as Freshers' Welcome, Singing Competition 'Awaaz', theatre festival, Annual Cultural Festival 'Tide', North East Festival 'Rainbow', Annual Sports Day, sports tournaments for students and staff as well as cultural programmes on Annual Day, Foundation Day, Teacher's Day and Alumni meet. Such programmes make the college life vibrant and memorable. College comes up with multiple magazines/newsletters (Udyachal, Samanvya, Synergy, Vaanijyadoot, Blue Sky, society magazines) fostering creativity and critical thinking. Rangsheersh Jaidev Theatre Festival, a 4-day event, is one of its own and covers 2 theatre performances (one by students, one by alumni), one theatre performance competition and one street play competition.

ARSD has completed its 60 years and has witnessed a remarkable growth and looking forward to a bright future.
